entral Corridor Transit Transport Facilitation Agency (CCTTFA) participated in 14th Annual Joint Transport Sector Review (JTSR) that took place in October in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania. Organized by the ministry of Works and Transport, the one-day event brough together all the government agencies (works, transport and academic) working under the ministry to review progress of their activities and projects.

The Guest of Honor was Deputy Minister of Works and Transport, Hon. Eng. Godfrey Kasekenya who applauded CCCTTFA for sponsoring the gathering and for being an influential partner in advocating for trade facilitation along the Central Corridor to its member countries and for promoting the port of Dar

es Salaam. The day proceedings were chaired by Mr. Gabriel Migire, Permanent Secretary in the Ministry of Works and Transport and the current Chair of CCTTFA Executive Board.

In his presentation to the plenary, CCTTFA Executive Secretary Capt. Dieudonne Dukundane emphasized on the need for Tanzania to focus on outward thinking in accessing the Central Corridor markets. He congratulated the government of Tanzania for heavily investing in infrastructure projects across the board (port of Dar es Salaam, inland waterways, Standard Gauge Railway, Meter Gauge Railway and road infrastructure) compared to other Central Corridor member states and therefore strategically placing Tanzania as the gateway to those markets.


CCTTFA Marine Cadets Training Programme Makes Remarkable Progress

CTTFA has managed to secure sea-time for nine (9) out ten (10) cadets undergoing training at the Dar es Salaam Marine Institute (DMI). at various shipping companies in the Middle East. Eight Cadets are working for shipping companies from United Arab Emirates (UAE) and one works for Jana Marine Services Company in Saudi Arabia. The duration of their internship ranges between 8 – 12 months where they are expected to gain experience required to finishing their professional course at DMI.

Cadet Richard Nadonye who is working for Jana Marine Services Company Limited in Saudi Arabia says he is enjoying his experience working for an international company that has vessels fitted with latest navigation equipment and he believes his 10 months experience will equip him with the required skills. According to Richard, this experience has also accorded him an opportunity to meet and work with other seafarers from different parts of the world thus exchanging experiences and knowledge.

Capt. Malima Manyasi is the Assistant Course Coordinator at DMI who has been involved with the cadets since their inception in 2018 says he is proud of his students' accomplishments thus far, due to their dedication and hard work and believes they will acquire the skill needed to finish their professional course and graduate with Class 3 certification. He also added that through the support of CCTTFA, DMI has also started conducting training for staff of Marine Services Company Limited (MSCL) in Mwanza on various technical courses on marine transport and management.

CCTTFA plans to expand its training programme to include more institutions in all member states as part of its contribution to having international recognized and certified institutions. This is according to CCTTFA Head of Transport Policy & Planning Mr. Emmanuel Rutagengwa who says plans are underway to mobilize resources towards that endeavor and its implementation is underway in the 2021-2022 financial year.

2021 - 2025 Launched

he Central Corridor Transit Facilitation Agency launched its 5-Year Strategic plan for 2021–2025 at a short ceremony during the 11th Inter-State Council of Ministers meeting. Tanzania's Minister for Works and Transport Hon. Eng. Dr. Leonard Chamuriho, who also took the rotating Chairmanship from Rwandan Minister of Infrastructure Hon. Mr. Claver Gatete.

The theme for the strategic plan is 'Central Corridor, The Competitive and Sustainable Trade Route of Choice' with a focus on key infrastructure projects as highlighted by each member state. CCTTFA will work hand in hand with member states on resource mobilization of the major projects and will contribute its finances in carrying out feasibility studies in some of the identified strategic projects by the countries. CCTTFA will provide technical support

in terms of academic and practical training for staff in key government agencies responsible managing and maintaining the development projects such as ports, vessels and railways. The institutions as well will benefit in terms of support to produce strategic business plans and monitoring frameworks to enable them meet bare minimum expected international standards in their field of expertise.

This is the first time, CCTTFA 5-Year Strategic Plan has also produced a monitoring and evaluation framework in order to assess the progress achieved as well as to spot the challenges on time in order to address them. The Monitoring and Evaluation Framework for the CCTTFA 5-Year Strategic Plan was developed with the assistance from Trade Mark East Africa (TMEA).

he impact on transport and trade patterns in the Central Corridor member countries is not immediately felt in the first six months of 2020 as most of the performance indicators reflected slight differences compared to the same period last in 2019. But a deep analysis of the entire period under review January to December 2020 depicts that there are effects on various key performance indicators that were directly affected by the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic.


